There's been some exciting things going on with AADA in the past few months! We had a successful 2-day symposium over the summer, transitioned our Adultspan journal to a new publisher, and are gearing up to see everyone in Toronto for the ACA Spring conference.

Our 2-day symposium featured 10 keynote speakers focused on concerns across the lifespan and advocacy. We hope to offer the session recordings in the future for continuing education credit, so be on the lookout for more information to come there.

Adultspan Fellowship

The Adultspan Journal recently started a new initiative, under the current Editor-in-Chief Dr. Kaprea F. Johnson (The Ohio State University) to mentor doctoral students and junior faculty members through an Adultspan Journal Fellowship.

The Adultspan fellowship gives students the opportunity to work on an Academic journal in multiple capacities. Currently, the fellowship has 4 different fellowship positions. The Managing Editor fellow which oversees and coordinates the publications editorial activities. 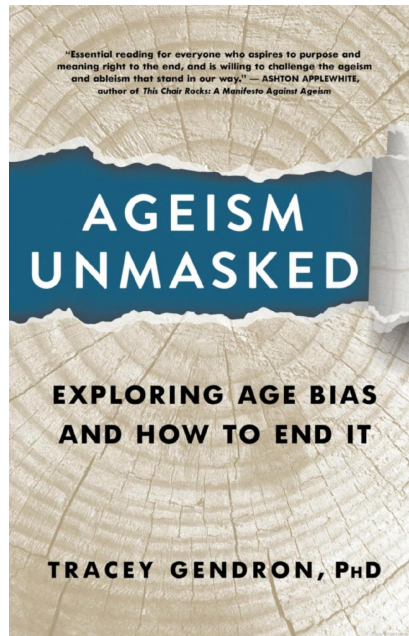

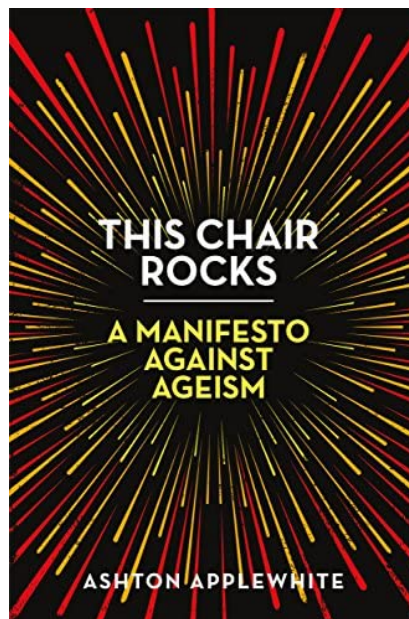

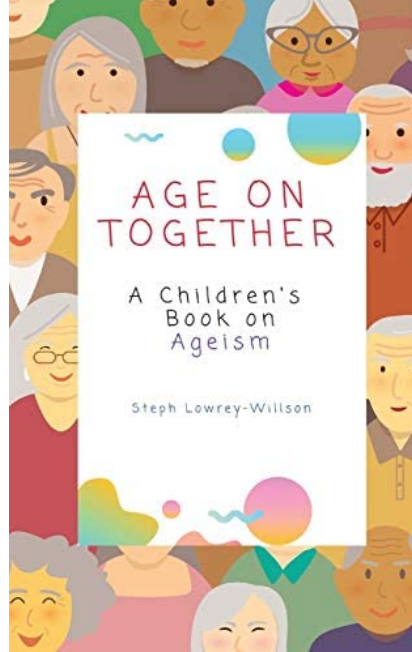
Books: A way to fight against Ageism

This webinar will discuss the unique challenges of grieving during the holidays and what resources, rituals, and other clinical interventions might be helpful to use with clients across the lifespan.

1. Identify and understand the unique issues and experiences related to grief and loss during the holidays across the lifespan.
2. Discuss how models and systems theory of grief and loss can be integrated into working with clients experiencing a variety of developmental losses, including both death and non-death related loss during the holidays.
